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





Privacy



Only 3% of 372 trails surveyed across the U.S. had experienced a major crime The surveyed trails represent 7,000 total miles and 45 million estimated

Liability

State law

 Holds landowners harmless for trespass related to recreational activities like hiking and biking (General Obligations Law 9-103)

Homeowners' insurance

• Most policies ensure the right to legal representation in trespass suits

Municipal insurance

- Municipal governments can extend their insurance coverage to landowners along a trail through additional insureds certificates...usually done as part of a trail access agreement
- Trails usually have no impact on local government's general liability premium
